

THE EU'S ARCTIC UNIVERSITY

The University of Lapland, established in 1979 on the Arctic Circle in the heart of Lapland, is the northernmost university in the European Union. Given this location, the university community engages with issues particularly salient in the North, such as indigenous peoples, tourism, mining, design and education. In one facet of this commitment, the institution co-ordinates the University of the Arctic (UArctic), a network of some 160 universities and other organisations in the Circumpolar North.

Internationally recognised for contributions in a number of fields, the University is working to strengthen its role as a hub of teaching and research in the Arctic. As part of this effort, it seeks to further the broader aims of sustainable development, well-being and equality both locally and globally.
